INTRODUCTION

The Inventory of Parent Education and Support Services, developed by the Parent Education Partnership (PEP), is a comprehensive list of parenting education and support services in Delaware. This inventory will allow state and community agencies to refer parents to services that are most appropriate to them, as well as allowing agencies to better interact and network with each other.

There are three major sections in the Parent Education and Support Inventory. The first section contains the Quick Reference Guide, that lists the parent education and support agencies and programs in alphabetical order, the specific populations that are served, and the counties in which these programs are offered. The second section includes a Quick Reference Guide listing services offered Statewide. The third section is an up to date description of the programs, and provides contact information.

Information for the 1998 Inventory was requested from each agency or program in the 1997 Inventory. Information was also solicited from all school districts and other agencies that had been identified as providers of parent education and support. Follow-up attempts to gather information were made to all providers who did not respond some without success. Therefore, the information is the most up to date and accurate as could be assembled.

Since parent education and support programs continue to develop and change, the PEP is aware that not all parent education and support programs have been identified and that the Inventory will need to be updated annually.

The Parent Education Partnership would like to thank everyone whose efforts contributed to the preparation of the Inventory.

The team includes pediatricians, psychologists, neurologists, developmental nurse specialists, public health nurses, child development specialists, social workers, nutritionists, speech language pathologists, and occupational and physical therapists. A unique feature of the CDW team is that it is multiagency. The Division of Public Health has the lead agency responsibility for administering the identification, assessment, service coordination, and intervention of the special needs child and family. Other agencies that are part of the CDW team are: Division of Mental Retardation, Division of Family Services, Department of Public Instruction, Medical center of Delaware and DuPont Hospital for Children. Once a child is determined for early intervention services, the primary care physician along with the CDW team assist the family in receiving services for the special needs child. Parent training, support and counseling are examples of services that are provided to enhance the child's development.</p>

Delaware law requires that divorcing parents with children attend an education program. The goal of this program is to help educate parents to the effects of divorce upon their children and to help both parties learn how to minimize the harmful effects whenever possible. The programs, which must provide at least six hours of instruction over a minimum of two sessions offered on two separate days, addresses the impact of separation and divorce on children, developmental stages of children, what children need from their parents after separation or divorce, successful co-parenting, and strategies for coping with new family structures. Parents with children aged 8 to 16 years must attend a children's education program. Parents with a history of domestic violence are required to attend a more intensive course designed to address the issues of domestic violence and its effects on children. During Parent and Child Activity Time, parents are able to model what they have learned in Parent Education as well as engage in activities that reinforce their child's learning. Another observation tool used by Even Start is the home visit, which is conducted monthly. Learning activity packets are brought into the home and modeled for the parent. This reinforces and builds on the child's learning experience in the classroom as well as creates accountability and follow-through for the parent.</p> <p><i>Curriculum/Topics Covered</i></p> <p>Even Start has trained parent educator/adult Ed instructors on staff who deliver parenting education as part of the family literacy curriculum. Parenting education is one of the key components of the Family Literacy model.
